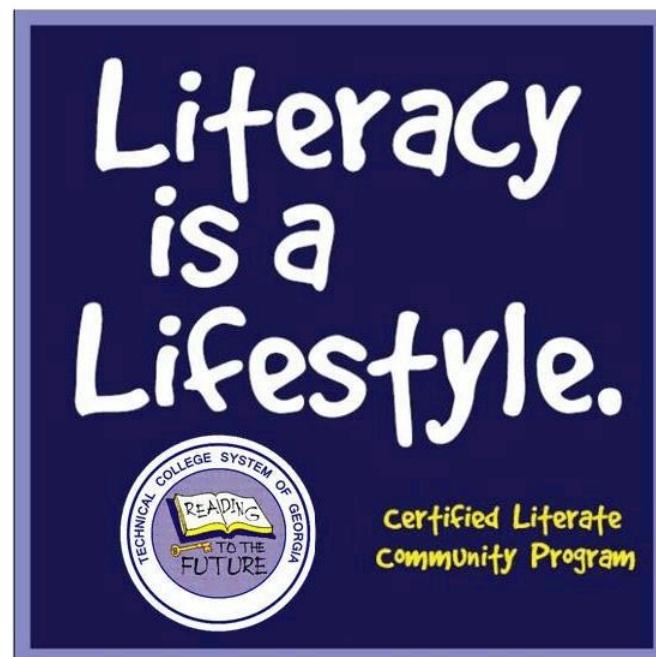


GEORGIA'S CERTIFIED LITERATE COMMUNITY PROGRAM 2016 STATEWIDE REPORT

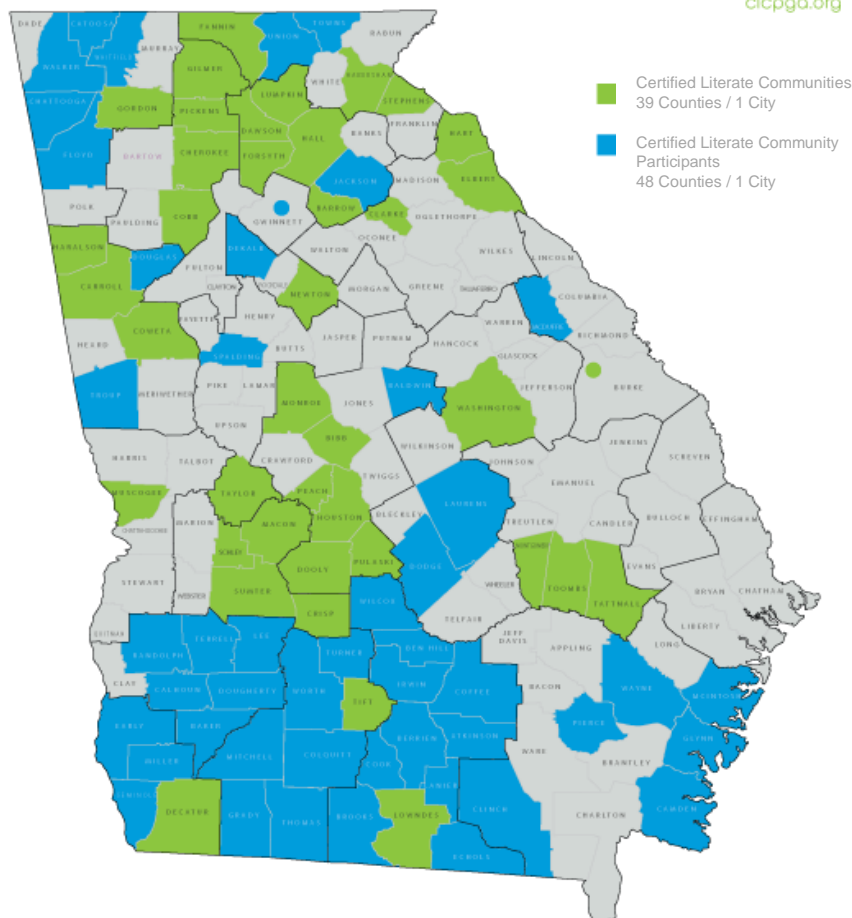

Mission Statement:

The mission of the Certified Literate Community Program is to mobilize every resource available to a community into a literacy campaign that functions within state certification guidelines and will result in a literate community.



In 2016, CLCP communities served 19,094 adult & family literacy students.

In 2016, **CLCPs raised over \$2.6 million in funding and donated materials** for adult education programs statewide. Of that, over \$1.4 million is funding for literacy from fundraisers, grants, foundations and annual giving campaign

CLCPs Serving their Communities in 2016

- ❖ Awarded 1,508 GED Testing scholarships; raised \$101,983 for the scholarships
- ❖ Awarded 25 post-secondary scholarships; raised \$21,598 for the scholarships
- ❖ 1,775 volunteers donated 40,163 hours of service
- ❖ 325 tutors provided 23,780 hours of volunteer tutoring

Sponsored/Provided

- ❖ 65 volunteer trainings; 206 volunteers trained
- ❖ 34 tutor trainings; 89 tutors trained
- ❖ 24 volunteer recognition celebrations
- ❖ 24 GED Testing graduation ceremonies; 18 graduation receptions

- ❖ 662 dictionaries for Adult Education students; 338 thesauruses
- ❖ 7,340 print articles, ads, letters to the editor, guest columns, PSAs (radio and television) and DVDs
- ❖ 7 billboards
- ❖ 45,621 flyers, brochures and bookmarks distributed
- ❖ \$9242 raised/donated for marketing/advertising
- ❖ 147 presentations to civic organizations
- ❖ Participated in 108 community fairs and forums
- ❖ 70 fundraisers
- ❖ 72 Literacy Awareness events
- ❖ 34 Health Literacy awareness programs
- ❖ 12 Financial Literacy awareness programs
- ❖ 14 stay in school programs for high schools; \$74,356.95 in funding
